Dear SWAAG Members,








Please describe your previous involvement in The Southwestern Geographer (check all that apply) ³⁹ responses




Frequency of Use






Impact Factor and Incentive to Publish

Knowing that the journal does not have an impact factor or DOI, please indicate your feelings of hesitancy toward publishing a manuscript in it.



Preferred Periodicity of Journal


Under practical circumstances, what should be the periodicity of the journal? 37 responses






Preferred Mode of Publication

Under practical circumstances, what should be the mode of publication for the journal? ^{38 responses}






Preferred Types of Publications

Under practical circumstances, what type of contributions should the journal publish? Check all that apply.



Under practical circumstances, where should the journal's focus be regarding potential authors/contributors?



Comments

"SWAAG members should be more diligent (myself included) in advertising the journal as a potential publication venue for undergraduate and graduate students. In my institution, some of our undergrads are engaged in very interesting research and the journal could be a great place for them to publish."

"[H]onestly, I don't see value of this journal. Human and financial resources dedicated to it would better serve SWAAG constituency in the form of successfully publishing or - more broadly - making the fruits of scholarly labor available at large."

"Online, quick editorial turn around, financial support for administrative assistant"

"Make more people aware of its existence. Make it sharable on social media."

> "I think something online and open access would be useful. Although all should be welcome, focusing on students would be a good thing."

"Have more of a student focus."

"The student-first vibe of SWAAG meetings is kind of the special sauce of the org (in my opinion) so it would be cool for the journal to be an extension of that vibe. One approach would be to make it the "first place a SWAAG student publishes" by offering diverse types of submissions as listed above. Maybe each volume only has 1-2 full peer reviewed research articles, but also 2-3 brief field reports, 1-2 photo essays, etc. Students could essentially work their way up from photo essay to research article as they're research develops through grad school; and get some ink on their CVs while they're in the region. Just one idea."

Comments – cont.

"If we keep the journal, we should work to increase its visibility and reputation by getting an impact factor and DOI, actively soliciting submissions, etc. I'd like for SWAAG to have a journal but not in its current form. I don't currently have the bandwidth to take the lead on this kind of effort, but would strongly support it once the basics are in place." "I like the idea of photo-essays. Indeed, I have one ready to submit."

"No opinion at this time."

"I would be curious to know how many AAG regions have journals and how the frequency and readership of Southwestern compares to others. Also, how has the strategy of Southeastern Geographer differed from Southwestern, given its pursuit by that journal of an impact factor and upcoming transition to primarily online, print optional...Impact factor and indexing are important when it comes to having tenure track professors publish in the journal due to the emphasis on quality metrics in RPT documents. Without those, it seems like Southwestern may be more of a place for students to try their hand at publishing peer reviewed articles—still a valuable aim." "Remove the requirement to make an account/password. It seems like a small barrier, and I'm sure it's useful, but I definitely just gave up the idea of even reading the journal, much less publishing in it. I figured if I didn't want to make a password just to browse, other people probably wouldn't want to make one to read my work."

"It would be nice if the journal could be twice a year, but once a year would be fine if it helped to generate a sufficient number of good quality, relevant articles (4-5) per issue. Although I personally prefer print and online, if it would create more difficulties to include the print version, I would be completely on board with a peer-reviewed online journal. To recap, twice a year print + online would be ideal; annually and online would be fine."

Comments – cont.

"[H]ow about use openreview[?]"

"In order to revive this publication, it will need a clear mission. What purpose could this serve geographers in our region? Could it be a place for focus on southwestern research? Or a place for students/faculty to publish joint research? Or something more structured like one theme/one editor based on the theme/and essays related to that topic? Like a yearbook? Isn't that what the APCG does?"

"I think The Southwestern Geographer could be a great way for students to get experience publishing their work, and working on editing/reviewing material to be published. I also think it gives us the chance to be in community and dialogue with each other with the same spirit of our annual meetings and could reinvigorate people to participate in SWAAG activities."

"Target students, like the Geographical Bulletin. Involve graduate students in the peer review process and encourage undergrad and grad students to submit."

"I am unfortunately going to advocate for the journal's demise. It is difficult enough to get people to review for the journal and the idea of making this a student-run, or student focused journal just puts more labor on the backs of students. Additionally, the difficulty in getting faculty reviewers even for special issues that were thematically focused was hard. I worked with [name redacted] to try and help [name redacted] get reviewers and it went nowhere. We had quiet quitting going on years ago, partly because it was a journal no potential reviewer had heard of. Succinctly, our students are seeking larger venues to publish in and the SWG is not a viable option. If there was a relationship with a publisher, such as what SEDAAG has with UNC press, then perhaps there would be the support and ease of access that could help".
